PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear friends of Martin Saints,

Archbishop Nelson Pérez recently asked every Philadelphia priest and deacon to read a new book, From Christendom to Apostolic Mission: Pastoral Strategies for an Apostolic Age.

The book begins with a quote from Archbishop Fulton Sheen: "We are at the end of Christendom. Not of Christianity, not of the Church, but of Christendom."

He means that we are living through the end of an era. For centuries, "Christendom" provided us with a common identity that at least nominally shaped our culture and politics. But in our day, the west is abandoning even token accountability to Christian morals.

It's possible to track some of these trends statistically. For example, pollsters report that 40% of 20-somethings identify as "nones." 62% of the ex-Catholics in that group left the Church before age 18.

But we don't need statistics to tell us what we all experience daily in our society. As Bob Dylan once sang, "you don't need a weatherman to know which way the wind blows."

Once upon a time, it might have been possible to catch the faith by osmosis, simply by showing up and participating in society and our civic institutions. But no more.

Nowadays, to hold or grow in the faith, it requires intention. We have to want it, to choose it, and be willing to be countercultural.

Perhaps paradoxically, this is where hope starts to emerge. From *Christendom to Apostolic Mission* proposes that we should live our lives "in the full consciousness of this hour of testing, and rally close to the heart of Christ." Like the early apostles, obstacles and challenges can sharpen and quicken our faith.

G.K. Chesterton wrote that a dead thing flows with the current, but only a living thing can swim against the stream.

This is why we have Martin Saints.

We are on an apostolic mission. We are a living thing, swimming against the stream.

We are a school with a sober, clear-eyed view of today's culture. And yet still we insist: the glory of God is man fully alive. Everything that is good, true, and beautiful is still fresh and vital. The Holy Spirit still pumps in our veins.

Co-operating with God's grace, at Martin Saints, we have done something truly special together. Please behold this annual report, and cherish what you – our students, parents, teachers, donors, and friends – have built together at our young school.

As you look at this report, please study the faces of our students, and share in their joy and accomplishments. Please read all the quotes and testimonials, and remember how important it is to support this work and build our school together.

The good news is that whatever else may be happening in the world, you really can start and grow a school, with a curriculum like it ought to be, with a culture that is wholesome and good.

The good news is that whatever else may be happening in the world, we have just graduated our third class of students. Our new little school is growing and, praise God, someday soon we will need to move into larger premises.

Once again, it's possible to track some of these trends statistically. We've put a few graphs in this report.

More broadly, the ecumenical Association of Classical Christian Schools has done a national poll over several years, comparing graduates from classical, parochial, and public schools. Their statistics show that the classical alumni have significantly higher rates of church attendance, gratitude for their lives, and generosity to charity (as well as lower rates of divorce and premarital cohabitation).

But again, we don't need statistics to tell us what we all experience daily in our school.

At Martin Saints, academics are the heart of school life. In class, our teachers lead our students through the great books of western civilization, searching for truth, beauty, and wisdom.



But our students and teachers also go camping together. They go on the March for Life. They serve the poor. They attend orchestras, theaters, and museums. They have craftsmanship classes, and work with their hands. Most importantly, they pray and worship together every day.

Martin Saints is a community of ordinary people who aim high. Martin Saints is a community of families, faculty, and donors who are building a faithful and resilient school for today's challenges, and for the future.

Our work together has a financial side. We are still several years away from being fully enrolled. That means, for now, that only about 50% of our revenue comes from tuition. Moreover, roughly 60% of our students receive some form of financial aid.

Financially, you make up the difference. The difference comes from you, from faithful and generous friends who believe that Philadelphia needs a school like this, who want to see a school like this take root and grow.


Pope Benedict taught that while the world offers us comfort, we were made for greatness. Please, will you say a prayer over this annual report, and consider making a donation.

DIRECTOR OF ADVANCEMENT


It has been my pleasure to be the Director of Advancement at Martin Saints this past year. The best part of my job is the vibrant community that surrounds such a wonderful institution.

EITC/OSTC

Instead of sending your tax dollars to Harrisburg, you can redirect and designate your annual state taxes to fund scholarships at Martin Saints Classical High School.

Please contact us for a short application. Here's how it works:

The Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) is a Pennsylvania program supporting all students with financial need. The Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit (OSTC) is a similar program, but prioritizing students who also live in low performing public school districts.

An individual or business owner with an annual Pennsylvania tax liability over \$1000, and up to the amount you owe in state taxes, is eligible to enroll and designate their state taxes to fund these programs.

It costs you a penny to donate a dime. You will receive a 90% tax credit for your contribution to this program. The money will directly fund scholarships for young men and women at Martin Saints.

2022-2023 TRACK AND CROSS COUNTRY

Sophomore Magdalena Baumeister medaled at Districts and advanced to the State Championships in her first cross country season.

Senior Ty Tindal qualified for State, East Coast, and National indoor track championships. Ty placed sixth in one of the fastest hurdle races in the country. He won his third District championship 300mm hurdles title and advanced to the State Championships.

Martin Saints completed its inaugural girls tennis season during the fall 2022 semester. Seven freshman and one sophomore, all with no competitive match experience, comprised the team that competed against the varsity teams from Little Flower, Springfield Township, and Archbishop Wood, as well as the junior varsity team from Cardinal O'Hara.

The team recorded its first win against the O'Hara JV team with Catharine D'Agostini at singles, as well as Nora Raybould/Jacqueline Perry and Katie Ferguson/Delaney Stryd winning at doubles. While varsity matches were against older students, they provided valuable experience that built confidence.










ENROLLMENT TRENDS









